What is Local Body Politics (LBP)?

LBP refers to the *governance and administration of a city or district by elected representatives. These people are in charge of making important decisions that directly impacts the community.

What is Governance*?

Governance is how a group of people, make decisions and run things. Like being the leaders of a big team.

So what do they even do? Well here's a Simple Breakdown:

Decision-Making: Governance is about making rules and decisions that help everyone in the community live better. Think of it like setting the rules for a game so everyone knows how to play.

Leadership: Leaders in governance, like mayors and councillors, are chosen to make sure these rules are fair and followed. They're like the team captains who guide everyone and make important choices.

Organisation: It involves organising resources (like money and services) to solve problems and make improvements, similar to how a team manager would organise equipment and practice sessions to help the team succeed.

Responsibility: People in these "governance" roles are responsible for listening to the community's needs and making decisions that benefit everyone, much like how a good captain (of your favourite sports team) would listen to their teammates to make the best plays.


Why should you care?

Good governance helps ensure that:

Communities are safe: By having rules and services like police and fire departments.

Things run smoothly: Like making sure the roads are in good shape and the water is clean.

Everyone's voice is heard: So that all members of the community, including young people, can share their ideas and concerns.

What Are Electorates?

Definition: Electorates are geographical areas represented by a member of the council. In local body politics, often called wards.

Purpose: They ensure that different parts of Tauranga have a voice in the council. Each electorate has its unique needs and priorities.

Map of Electorates: Highlighting different wards in Tauranga and their respective councillors.

Te Awanui Ward: Covers the entire area. The person chosen to represent the Te Awanui Ward (the Māori Ward) will make sure Māori communities are heard and treated fairly. This Māori ward councillor will focus on sharing the views and hopes of people with Māori heritage. But, they'll also represent everyone in the city.

*The Deputy Mayor does the same job as the other councillors but takes over if the Mayor is away or unable to do their job

Role of the Council

Representation: Councillors are elected to represent the interests of those who live in those wards (called constituents).

Decision-Making: The council makes decisions on local policies, budgets, and services.

Services Provided: Councils manage local infrastructure (roads, water supply), recreational facilities (parks, sports grounds), and community services (libraries, community centres) They also often help to fund events and other initiatives that the community want to see happen.

How does Tauranga City Council work?

The community votes for 1 Mayor and 9 ward Councillors.

Mayor: Elected citywide and leads the council.

Councillors: Elected from different wards. Each ward has a certain number of councillors based on its population size.

Number the Candidates: Instead of ticking a box, you will rank the candidates by putting numbers next to their names.

Put a "1" next to the candidate you like the most.

Put a "2" next to your second favourite candidate.

Continue numbering your choices in order of preference (3, 4, 5, etc.).

You can vote for as many or as few candidates as you like.

What Do the Numbers Mean?

"1": This is your top choice, the candidate you want to win the most.

Other Numbers: These show your backup choices in order. For example, "2" is your second favourite, "3" is your third, and so on.

If your top choice doesn't get enough votes to win, your vote can still count towards your next choice.

If your top choice has more than enough votes to win, some of your vote can help your next choice.

Important Things to Remember:

You must have a "1" for your vote to count.

The numbers must be in order (1, 2, 3, etc.) with no repeats.

If you make a mistake, your vote is valid up to where the mistake happened. For example, if you rank 1, 2, 3, and then skip to 5, only 1, 2, and 3 will count.

HOW IS THE CITY COUNCIL FUNDED?





How is the City Council Funded?

Ever wonder where the city council gets its money and how it impacts you?

Here's a quick rundown:

- **Rates:** Unlike the central government, which relies on income and sales taxes, your city council primarily gets its money from rates.
- **Grants and Subsidies:** They receive grants and subsidies, including their share of road taxes and development contributions.

The city council also makes money through:

• **Regulatory Fees:** These include things like parking fines.

- **Selling Services:** When you pay to use public swimming pools or other services, that money goes to the council.
- **Investments:** They earn interest from investing funds into other things.

For bigger projects, like building new infrastructure, councils often need to borrow money. They usually do this through the Local Government Funding Agency, which offers lower interest rates than regular banks.

Understanding this helps you see how city projects get funded and why certain fees exist. Plus, knowing this can empower you to be more involved in local decisions that affect your community.

How Local Government Affects Your Life Every Day

Local government plays a big role in your daily life. Here's how:

- **Clean Water:** That fresh water from your tap? Local government ensures it's there.
- **Public Spaces:** Want to hang out at the park or swim at the local pool? Council ensures these spaces, trees and gardens are maintained.
- **Parking:** They manage parking spaces, so you have a place to leave your car when you're out.
- Libraries and Amenities: Whether you're borrowing a book or playing sport at the QE2 Youth Centre, local government makes it possible.
- **Street Lighting:** Walking your dog at night? They keep the streets well-lit and safe.

• **Rubbish and Recycling:** They handle your rubbish and recycling, keeping your neighbourhood clean.

Local government also:

- **Plans Your Area:** They shape how your community develops and manage the environment.
- **Sets Local Rules:** They create and enforce laws that keep the community running smoothly.
- **Supports Community Initiatives:** From tackling homelessness to reducing crime and creating jobs, they're involved in making your area better and safer.
- **Emergency Planning:** They prepare for emergencies to keep you safe during disasters.
